THE LAST FIVE STAR GENERAL – OMAR N. BRADLEY

Omar N. Bradley was a humble man who was given the nickname "the GI General" by the famous World War II news correspondent Ernie Pyle. (History.com Editors, 2018) General Bradley earned this nickname because of his low-key style and always extending courtesy to everyone regardless of rank. The nickname is also a reflection of General Bradley's beginning.

Clark, MO was the birth place of General Bradley. (Nash, 1982) He arrived in this world on 12 February 1893. At the age of thirteen his father who was a school teacher passed away. His father's passing put family in financial hardship. Education beyond high school would be unlikely. However, General Bradley's Sunday school superintendent advised him to apply for entrance into U.S. Military Academy at West Point, NY and he was accepted.

General Bradley graduated from West Point in 1915 in the class that became known as the "class the stars fell on". (Nash, 1982) His class earned this expression of praise because thirty members became general officers. After graduation then Second Lieutenant Bradley married Mary Elizabeth Quayle who was a high school classmate in December 1916. General Bradley did not participate in military operations in World War I. He served in various posts and training assignments until 1941 when he was promoted to Brigadier General. General Bradley was the first of his class to be promoted to general officer.

In 1943 General Bradley became commander of Second U.S. Army Corps in Norther Africa. (Nash, 1982) Under General Bradley's leadership his troops defeated the German Forces in North Africa. From North Africa his troops went on to oust the German Forces in Sicily. After North Africa and Sicily military campaigns General Bradley was called to London, U.K. to assist in planning Operation OVERLORD, the invasion of northern France. (History.com Editors, 2018)

After the launch of the Normandy invasion on 6 June 1944 General Bradley was on the ground in northern France within twenty-four hours. (Nash, 1982) He devised Operation COBRA, the breakout of U.S. Armed Forces from the Cotentin Peninsula into the rest of France. (History.com Editors, 2018) General Bradley and his troops carried their march all the way into Germany. They met up with Soviet Union Forces on 25 April 1945. (Nash, 1982) Hostilities in Europe officially ended on 8 May 1945 (West) or 9 May 1945 (East). (Rapp, 1969) During this time General Bradley earned an important distinction, "As an army group commander from August 1, 1944, to V-E

Day in May 1945, Bradley commanded more troops than any general in American history: four armies, twelve corps, forty-eight divisions–in all, over 1.3 million troops." (History.com Editors, 2018)

After World War II General Bradley became Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army from 1948 to 1953. (Nash, 1982) He went on to serve as Joint Chief of Staff. During his tenure as Joint Chief he was promoted to General of the Army (five-star general).

General Bradley entered civilian life in 1953. (History.com Editors, 2018) He worked at the Bulova Watch Company as the chairman of the board of directors starting in 1958. (Nash, 1982) In 1965 his wife, Mary Elizabeth, passed away. He remarried in 1966 to Ester Buhler. General Bradley spent his remaining years at Fort Bliss, TX. As an individual who holds the rank of five-star general he did not officially retire from active duty.

General Bradley was called from this life on 8 April 1981 at the age of 89, and 70 years of military service to his country. (Nash, 1982) Upon his death, General Omar N. Bradley became The Last Five Star General.

ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is a timed honored tradition in the Holy Catholic Church. It is time for the Faithful to reflect on all the blessings God has bestowed on them. During Adoration the Faithful sometimes petition God to aid them through troubling times. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament has its roots in the beginning of the Church. Over time Adoration evolved into the ceremony of today.

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament begins with the Eucharist. What is the Eucharist? "The Eucharist is 'the source and summit of the Christian life". (USCCB, 1994) This sacrament unites the Faithful with God. Christ instituted the Blessed Sacrament at the Last Supper:

While they were eating, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and giving it to his disciples said, "Take and eat; this is my body."

Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins.

I tell you, from now on I shall not drink this fruit of the vine until the day when I drink it with you new in the kingdom of my Father." (USCCB, 1986)

Christ proclaims the Eucharist is the new covenant. When the bread and wine are consecrated they become Christ' body and blood, the Eucharist, they still retain their physical characteristics. This process is called transubstantiation. (USCCB, 1994) Today the Blessed Sacrament is displayed in a Monstrance during Adoration. (Catholic-Church.org, 2017) The Monstrance is placed on the altar so the Blessed Sacrament can clearly be seen by all the Faithful during Adoration.

There are several reasons to attend Adoration. One reason was expressed by Pope Paul VI, "To visit the Blessed Sacrament is... a proof of gratitude, and expression of love, and a duty of adoration toward Christ our Lord". (USCCB, 1994) The Faithful should always express their thankfulness to God. One way is to take time out to attend Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Taking time out is reminiscent of Christ' words to the apostles before he was betrayed, "So you could not keep watch with me for one hour?" (USCCB, 1986) This passage is the basis for many Catholic parishes having the Holy Thursday Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. Depending on the parish the Adoration may be a few hours or extend to noon on Good Friday. Attending Adoration is a way to rest from worldly burdens. Christ instructs the Faithful, "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." (USCCB, 1986) In this hurry-up and get it done yesterday world attending Adoration is a good way for the Faithful to clear their mind of worldly clutter.

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament varies depending on location and time of year. At some Catholic parishes the Rosary and Benediction follow Adoration. On Holy Thursday Adoration follows the Washing of the Feet Service. Usually no group prayers are said during this Adoration. One prayer of thanksgiving is consistent from parish to parish:

O, SACRAMENT MOST HOLY! O, SACRAMENT DIVINE! ALL PRAISE AND ALL THANKSGIVING BE EVERY MOMENT THINE!
