#### **Election Timeline**

1 May 2020

The Faithful Navigator (FN) Frank Pollak or his designated representative will contact the council membership requesting nominations for council officer positions and set a response deadline of 15 May 2020.

The membership contacts FN Frank Pollak or his designated representative with their nomination(s).

## **Election Timeline Continued**

Nominations will be forwarded to FN Frank Pollak.

Faithful Scribe Chris Cooper will place the names of the nominees on the Assembly website.

FN Frank Pollak or his designated representative will contact each nominee to confirm their acceptance.

15 May 2020 Nominations will close at 11:59 pm local time.

FN Frank Pollak forwards the nominations and acceptances to Faithful Captain David Rosero and to Faithful Admiral Paul Tomacelli.

1 June 2020 Faithful Admiral Tomacelli or his designated representative will contact the membership with the list of nominees.

The list of nominees will also be posted on the Assembly website.

1 June 2020 Voting begins.

Ballots may be cast via email, mail, or online. Details will be sent out prior to the election.

In the event there is only one nomination for each officer position a vote by acclamation will be called.

10 June 2020 All ballots must be submitted no later than 11:59 PM.

FN Frank Pollak receives the ballots and immediately forwards copies to the Faithful Captain Rosero and his committee.

14 June 2020 Faithful Captain Rosero and his committee tally the ballots and report the voting results to FN Frank Pollak.

15 June 2020 FN Frank Pollak or his designated representative announces the election results to the membership.

22 June 2020 Any member contesting the vote will contact FN Frank Pollak or his designated representative with their objections.

23 June 2020 FN Frank Pollak instructs Faithful Scribe Chris Cooper to formally record the newly elected Assembly officers in the minutes, unless there is a legitimate objection.

#### **SAINT RADEGUND**

The Dark Ages was a turbulent time in the history of Western Europe. It spanned from 476 A.D. to 1000 A.D. (Hamil, 1963) This time frame was marked with a breakdown of the central government after the fall of the Roman Empire. Frequent invasions of the Norse and Germanic barbarian tribes were an everyday part of life. The instability caused by these events led to a collapse of the economy. There were bright lights during these stormy times. One such bright light was Saint Radegund.

St. Radegund was born in 518 A.D. (Sencicle, 2005) Her birthplace was the kingdom of Thuringia which will become a province in present day Germany. Her father was the monarch of Thuringia, King Berthair. (Encyclopedia.com, 2020) King Berthair was a pagan. (Sencicle, 2005) She had a happy childhood until her homeland was invaded by the Franks.

When St. Radegund was a young girl the Franks invaded Thuringia. (Sencicle, 2005) King Chlotar I led the Frankish forces in this incursion into Thuringia territory. (Encyclopaedia Britannica, 2020) He took St. Radegund as prisoner in 531 A.D.

King Chlotar I was a person of questionable character at best. His ambitions to become king had no bounds. (Lauralee, 2018) King Chlotar I had his rival siblings murdered so he would eventually be made the Frankish monarch. Despite King Chlotar I professing to be a Christian he was a bigamist. (Encyclopedia.com, 2020) At the time of St. Radegund's capture he was married to four women; Guntheuca, Chunsina, Ingunde, and Aregunde. He had designs to make St. Radegund his fifth wife when she was old enough.

Despite King Chlotar I's brutish nature he made St. Radegund part of the Frankish court and she was treated well. He saw to her academic education. (Lauralee, 2018) St. Radegund learned Latin and she was able to converse in it fluently. (Encyclopedia.com, 2020) He also saw to her Catholic education which made her a very pious woman. (Lauralee, 2018) However, due to King Chlotar I's wanton personality St. Radegund made every effort to avoid him. (Encyclopedia.com, 2020)

- Upon St. Radegund's eighteenth birthday she unwillingly entered into marriage with King Chlotar I. (Encyclopedia.com, 2020) The wedding took place in 540 A.D. in the town of Soissons in modern day France's Hauts-de-France region. (Lauralee, 2018) During their marriage King Chlotar I had numerous liaisons with other women. His promiscuity allowed St. Radegund to devote all her energy to aiding the poor and the sick. St. Radegund was mocked by the royal court. They dubbed her "the queen-nun" because of her pious nature and helping the less fortunate. The people praised St. Radegund by calling her the "servant of the poor".
- St. Radegund decided to enter the religious life when her husband committed one too many heinous acts. (Lauralee, 2018) King Chlothar I murdered St. Radegund's brother. The year was 550 A.D. St. Radegund's brother was the last male heir of the Thuringia's royal family. King Chlothar I viewed him as a possible threat politically and militarily. The Bishop of Noyon, Medard vested her with the veil so she could officially become a nun. (Sencicle, 2005) Bishop Medard also bestowed upon her the office of deaconess. St. Radegund entered a religious community located in Poiter, France. King Chlothar I did make one attempt to force her to return to Frankish court. The Bishop of Paris, Germain, convinced King Chlotar I to abandon his efforts and leave St. Radegund in peace.
- St. Radegund spent the remainder of her live in Poiters, France. (Lauralee, 2018) She was the founder of Sainte-Croix monastery. The monastery was founded in 560 A.D. The monastery is also known as Holy Cross at Poiters. The Rules of Bishop Caesarius of Arles governed daily life in the monastery. After founding the monastery St. Radegund continued to minister to the poor and sick until her death on 13 August 587 A.D. (Encyclopaedia Britannica, 2020) The feast day for St. Radegund is 13 August.
