FORTRESS MASADA

The name Masada conjures up memories of the ancient life and death struggle of Jewish rebels and the Roman Empire in the first century A.D. There was a mini-series made about this epic battle in 1981 A.D. called *Masada* starring the late actor Peter O'Toole. (IMDb, 2020) Most of what is known about Fortress Masada comes from the Jewish-Roman historian Josephus. (World Heritage Encyclopedia, 2020) Along with archeology and modern science some interesting questions can be answered about Fortress Masada.

What is the origin of the name "Masada"? It comes from the Hebrew word Metzuda (מצדה) which literally means fortress. (Isseroff, 2009) Masada may also be referred to as Metzada, Masadah, or Massada.

Who constructed Masada? It is uncertain who first fortified Masada. Historians agree it was under the Hasmonean dynasty. (Encyclopaedia Britannica, 2020) The fortification occurred either under Jonathan Maccabeus who ruled the area in 143-142 B.C. or under Alexander Jannaeus who ruled the area in 103-76 B.C. The next round of major fortifications occurred under King Herod the Great. (Isseroff, 2009) King Herod the Great is the infamous king in *The Holy Bible* who ordered all the male children under the age of two years old murdered when he felt a threat to his power. (Perowne, 1963) Herod was forced to take refuge at Masada in 40 B.C. (Isseroff, 2009) A Jewish uprising took place at this time. Herod chose Masada because it is an ideal military position. Masada is located on a high plateau, and it has an easily defended approach. For this reason Herod added numerous palaces,

cisterns, and military buildings in case of future trouble with the Jewish people. The uprising was eventually quelled with the aid of the Roman military.

In the first century A.D. a Jewish separatist group known as the Zealots launched another rebellion against the Roman Empire. (Isseroff, 2009) A splinter group of the Zealots called the Sicarii managed to capture Masada in 66 A.D. Masada became the last Jewish military stronghold of the revolt. Under the reign of Roman Emperor Titus the Siege of Masada began in 73 A.D. (Bunting, 2020) The Roman X Legion under the command of General Lucius Silva constructed siege machines to conquer Fortress Masada. According to Josephus to avoid capture the defenders of Masada drew lots. (Isseroff, 2009) The individual chosen by lots killed all the inhabitants of Masada. Once his grim task was complete he committed suicide and ended the Jewish revolt.

In modern times archeologists have discovered many interesting artifacts at Fortress Masada. (Isseroff, 2009) They have uncovered evidence that supports Josephus' account of the Siege of Masada. The remains of an ancient Byzantine Christian Church have also been unearthed. Today Fortress Masada is one of the most popular tourist attractions in Israel.

GUARDIAN ANGELS

Guardian Angels are they real or are they just some folklore invented by parents to calm the fears of a small child? The Faithful cannot see them, but they are real according to Christ own words in *The Holy Bible*. Why would God create these supernatural beings? The origin of the word "angel" is the key to answer this question. Do these supernatural beings protect us from all things at all times or does God put a limitation on their abilities?

The first question to be addressed is if the Faithful cannot see angels how does the Faithful know they are there? Part of the answer is in the first two line of the Profession of Faith:

We believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. (See of Bkerke, 2012)

In the Profession of Faith the Faithful acknowledges there are parts of God's creation that cannot be seen. The second part of the question is answered in the Gospel of Saint Matthew 18:10:

"See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father." (USCCB, 1986)

From these passages the Faithful understand guardian angels cannot be seen and by the words of Christ in the Gospel of Saint Matthew they do exist.

Another question concerning guardian angels is why did God create them in the first place? The origin of the word "angel" explains why God created them. The word "angel" comes from ancient Greek " $\alpha\gamma\gamma\epsilon\lambda\varsigma\varsigma$ " meaning "messenger". (Collier's Encyclopedia, 1963) One example of an angel bringing a message from God is in the Gospel of Saint Luke 1:19:

And the angel said to him [Zechariah] reply, "I am Gabriel, who stand before God. I was sent to speak to you and to announce to you this good news. (USCCB, 1986)

God sent the Archangel Gabriel as His messenger to Zechariah to announce that Zechariah and his wife, Elizabeth, would have a son, John the Baptist. Further in the Gospel of Saint Luke 1:26-27 God sends out the Archangel Gabriel as His messenger again to announce the birth of Christ to Saint Mary:

In the sixth month, the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary.

Other examples of God sending out His angels to send out His Word and watch over the Faithful are the Archangel Michael who went to give aid to Daniel and the Archangel Raphael who went out to guide Tobit and his wife Sarah through troubling times. (USCCB, 1986)

God assigned a guardian angel to guide the Faithful from infancy to death. (USCC, 1994) Guardian angels watch over and intercede for the Faithful. The question is does God let guardian angels protects us from all danger or does He place limitations on them? The answer is in the Gospel of Saint Matthew 4:5-7:

Then the devil took Him [Christ] to the holy city, and made Him stand on the parapet of the temple, and said to Him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down. For it is written: 'He will command his angels concerning you' and 'with their hands they will support you, lest you dash your foot against a stone." Jesus answered him, "Again it is written, 'You shall not put the Lord, your God, to the test."

Christ asserts angels cannot protect those individuals who put God to the test by engaging in risky behavior. Guardian angels may intercede on the individual behalf, but that is all.

Guardian Angels are real creation of God and not just some folklore invented by parents to calm the fears of a small child. Even though the Faithful cannot see them they are among them every day as confirmed with Christ own words in *The Holy Bible*. God created them to watch over and intercede for the Faithful. These supernatural beings protect us, but their protection is limited by God in certain instances.
