PASSERBY

We have all been a passerby at one time or another in our lives. Sometimes we are just causal observers of an event no many how great or small. At other times we get personally involved. One reason we get involved is to render aid or assistance to someone who is need. Hopefully, we do not put on blinders and follow the path of the rich man who constantly ignored the poor beggar Lazarus in the Gospel of Saint Luke chapter sixteen versus nineteen through thirty-one. (Cardinal O'Boyle & Hickey, 1986) In *The Holy Bible* there are two examples of passersby who did great acts of kindness the Good Samaritan and Simon of Cyrene.

Before proceeding further a distinction should be drawn between a passerby and a busybody. Passerby has a benign definition. It is defined as, "a person passing by." (Braham, 1996) Busybody on the other hand has a malignant definition. It is defined as "a person who meddles in the affairs of others." I believe many passersby do not want to render aid to those in need because of their fear of being labeled a "busybody". A passerby should never be afraid to help others as long Christian Charity is their goal.

Two examples about passersby from *The Holy Bible* are the Parable of the Good Samaritan and Simon of Cyrene. (Cardinal O'Boyle & Hickey, 1986) In The Parable of the Good Samaritan from the Gospel of Saint Luke chapter ten verses twenty-nine through thirty-seven Christ tells the story of three passersby. The first two passersby could not be bothered with helping a man who was left for dead by robbers. These passersby were Levite Priests who should have been the examples of charity. However, they chose to ignore the distressed man and passed him by. Then the third passerby, the Good Samaritan, arrives at the scene. The Good Samaritan did not put blinders on and ignore his fellow man. He rendered aid with no expectation of reward or compensation for his efforts. On a side note this parable has inspired the name for the present day "Good Samaritan Laws." (Katz, 2018)

The second example of a passerby is Simon of Cyrene. Simon of Cyrene is cited in the Gospels of Saints Matthew, Luke, and Mark. (Cardinal O'Boyle & Hickey, 1986) He happened to be passing by when Christ was on his way to Calvary. Each of these Gospels agree he was "pressed into service" to help Christ carry the cross. Does it mean Simon of Cyrene was an unwilling participant? In my opinion the answer is no. The Roman soldiers who were parading Christ to Calvary did not ask for volunteers. They picked the first able bodied man who was closest to them. Anyone who has been in the military can relate to this scenario. Simon of Cyrene happened to be in the right place at the right time to help someone in need. His act of kindness is remembered to this day during Lent at the Fifth Station of the Cross. (Juergens, 1963) It should also be noted that Simon of Cyrene is the Patron Saint of Passersby. (Grondelski, 2017)

Everyone is a passerby from time to time. Most of the time passersby are just casual observers of everyday events. In a few instances a passerby is called to give aid and assistance whether voluntary or compulsory. Most passersby who give aid and assistance will probably not be famous as Simon of Cyrene. However small or great the act of kindness is it should always be given with good Christian Charity.
