The next 4th Degree Exemplification is 12 November 2022 in Hickory, NC.

Captain André Cailloux

Faithful Scribe Christopher R. Cooper

Captain André Cailloux is a true American hero. He is referred to as the "American Spartacus". (Smith, 2021) He was a former slave who served in the American Civil War. Captain Cailloux was also a family man and prior to the Civil War he was a successful business man.

André Cailloux was born on 25 August 1825 AD. (Baker, 2021) He was born into slavery. In July 1827 AD he entered the Catholic Church at the age of two when he received the Sacrament of Baptism. The location of his Baptism was Saint Louis Cathedral, MO. During his formative years his older siblings taught him the art of cigar making which he continued on into his adult life.

Captain Cailloux gained his freedom from slavery in 1846 AD at the age of twenty-one. (Baker, 2021) The following year he married his wife, Felicie Coulon, on 22 June 1847 AD. Later that year he adopted his wife's son, Jean Louis, who she had from a previous relationship. The couple went on to have four children of their own.

André Cailloux purchased his mother who was still a slave on 22 January 1849 AD. (Baker, 2021) He planned to emancipate his mother from slavery, but it is unclear if he was able to or not. There is speculation his mother passed away before he had a chance to emancipate her.

Captain Cailloux continued on in the cigar-making trade to support his family. (Baker, 2021) He became a successful business man in this line of work. Shortly before the American Civil War began he owned his own business in Faubourg Marigny District of New Orleans, LA. (The Louisiana Weekly, 2019) During his time as a business man he held the Office of Secretary in the Society of the Friends of Order and Mutual Assistants. (Baker, 2021) This organization provided aid to the Afro-Creole community in the area.

When the American Civil War broke out on 12 April 1861 AD André Cailloux joined the army of the Confederate States of America (CSA). (Baker, 2021) He served as a 1st Lieutenant. The unit Lieutenant Cailloux served in was the 1st Louisiana Native Guard. (The Louisiana Weekly, 2019) He and his fellow black Americans performed non-combat menial tasks. (Baker, 2021) Many of the black CSA soldiers only joined the Confederate forces to defend their lives and families from an invading force. (The Louisiana Weekly, 2019) When Union Forces under the command of Major General Benjamin F. Butler arrived in New Orleans the CSA abandoned the city. However, the black CSA soldiers did not join the retreating forces of the South. They remained to take care of their families. The 1st Louisiana Native Guard of the CSA was disbanded soon after the Union Forces took over.

Lieutenant Cailloux along with several of his comrades approached General Butler and struck an agreement for the former black CSA soldiers to form the Union Army's 1st Louisiana Native Guard. (The Louisiana Weekly, 2019) The Union Army place Lieutenant Cailloux in command of this unit and promoted him to Captain. His unit fought in the Siege of Port Hudson, LA. (Smith, 2021) Against insurmountable odds Captain Cailloux and his men fought with great courage. He met his end at this battle, but his troops led the union army to victory and Port Hudson fell on 9 July 1863 AD. (The Louisiana Weekly, 2019)

Due to CSA sharpshooters it was sometime before Captain Cailloux's body could be recovered from the battle field. (The Louisiana Weekly, 2019) He was given a hero's burial in New Orleans. Captain Cailloux's sacrifice along with his fellow black Americans opened to doors for many in the United States Armed Forces.
